**Governor Fight Ties Up Cash, Threatens Shutdown**

ATLANTA —(U.P.)— Gov. Herman Talmadge admitted Saturday that his struggling administration is on "stormy seas" as a state finance officer warned that if Georgia's gubernatorial feud last month among all major state functions will be halted for lack of funds.  
As Talmadge blamed former Gov. Ellis Arnall and "outside radicals" for building up the tide against his government, State Auditor B. E. Thrasher expressed alarm over a deadlock between the state treasurer, revenue commissioner, and attorney general.  
Until Atty. Gen. Eugene Cook recognizes Talmadge - appointed Charles Redwine as revenue commissioner, Treas. George Hamilton said he will not allow state funds to leave his office. Cook refuses to accept Redwine.  
Thrasher looked over his records and estimated that most state departments can last a month on money they now have but that six agencies will be out of funds around Saturday.

**Prof. Stern to Lecture at U. W. on Evolution**

"Chance and Evolution" will be the topic of a public lecture by Curt Stern, professor of zoology at the University of Rochester, Tuesday at 4:30 p. m. in the Biology bldg. auditorium at the University of Wisconsin.  
Born in Germany, educated at the University of Berlin, and trained at the Kaiser Wilhelm institute, Prof. Stern came to America in the early 30s as a fellow of the Rockefeller foundation.  
Considered one of the ablest biologists in the country, Prof. Stern has done much research in genetics. In his lecture in Madison he will deal with a relatively new aspect of evolution, the large part played by pure chance in variations in the evolution of plants and animals, including human beings.
