Vet Admits Fight, Denies Slaying Wife

LOS ANGELES — (U.P.) — An ex-marine who was considering self-imposed confinement in a psycho-neurotic ward was held on suspicion of murder today after admitting he quarreled with his estranged wife a few hours before her mutilated body was found trampled into the weeds of a vacant lot.

Frank E. French, 47, a veteran of two wars, swore "before me and my God" that he was not responsible for the death of his dark-haired, attractive wife, 45-year-old Jeanne T. French, a colorful "flying nurse" who once traveled as a part of the "international set" in Paris, London, and New York.

Police said that French's account of his activities between midnight Sunday and the discovery of the body Monday morning showed "major discrepancies."

"We believe we have the right man," officers said.

Mrs. French, a former movie actress and one-time companion to the New York socialite and oil heiress Millicent Rogers, was the victim of the city's second mutilation slaying in less than a month.

Her body was discovered by a bulldozer operator en route to a housing project. Scrawled in lipstick across her abdomen were the letters "B.D."

Police thought they stood for "Black Dahlia," the name applied to beautiful Elizabeth Short, who was murdered Jan. 15, but doubted there was any connection between the two cases.

Laraine, Leo Plan Havana Rendezvous

HOLLYWOOD—(U.P.)—Laraine Day and Leo Durocher plan a rendezvous in Havana, Cuba, next month to begin their much-delayed honeymoon — if Monday's court decision on their marriage is favorable, the film actress said today.

"The Havana meeting, when I get a vacation from my picture, is our only definite plan," Miss Day said. "We've talked over so many things that we don't have any complete plans for the future."

Durocher will leave alone Saturday by train for Orlando, Fla., where he is due to join his Brooklyn Dodgers baseball team Feb. 19. He won't be around when Miss Day appears in court to show cause why their marriage shouldn't be voided.
