June in January: Honeymooners Seek Vets'Housing Aid

It was June in January at the Madison housing center 1ast month, Mrs. John Mathewson, director, reported today.

Her monthly report showed that 47 out of 169 veteran applications for housing accommodations represented new marriages, and the number was higher than that for any month last year.

Madison had 350 unsettled families at the end of January, including 60 civilian applicants and 121 families from the previous month besides 169 veterans, she reported. Of the veteran applicants, 32 needed housing because of evictions, 23 had families in other cities, 20 were doubled up with relatives, three unable to find accommodations together, 11 were living in quarters too small, and 33 in temporary lodgings.

Inquiries for the month were high, totaling 2,631, and calls and interviews averaged 117 daily. During the month 10 light house-keeping units and two cottages were rented, nine veterans and three others settled, and 83 rooms rented.
