Oregon Woman Fined \$200 on Morals Count

Ida M. Haefner, Oregon, charged with lewd and lascivious conduct as the result of her cohabitation with Rudolph Klein, Oregon, last fall, was fined \$200 and costs or 90 days when she changed her not guilty plea to one of nolo contendere (no contest) in circuit court Wednesday. Klein had received the same penalty in superior court.

Mrs. Haefner, divorced and the mother of two children, told Judge Herman W. Sachtjen that she had worked so hard the day of her arrest that she was too tired to leave Klein to go home for the night.
