U.S. Battles to Rehabilitate Pacific Isles

AGANA, Guam-It is two and a half years since we bombed this island capital into destruction. Today it lies unreconstructed, symbol of the problems we inherited with 120 islands and atolls and 90,000 island inhabitants we don't need.

we think they need us, and it is a haird battle to prove it to them. The Japanese, according to a military government administrator, needed the natives in their economy and put them to work growing sugar and exporting phosphates and copra. We don't need the native sugar of much of

phosphates and copra. We don't need the native sugar of much of the copra, and the phosphates are still going onto Japanese farms. "This is our biggest problem," the administrator said, "to try to fit the natives into an economy where there's no market. We're trying to find one but handi-

crafts and sea shells are a limited field."

Only now is reconstruction work beginning in the native villege of Agana. The navy, charged with the responsibility for the island of Guam itself while the military government handles the rest of the Mariana, Marshall, and Western Caroline islands, is inclined to put blame for any further delay on the natives while the natives blame "Uncle Sam."

When the Americans came back to Guam after a shattering bombardment, they built new naval quarters outside the ruins of the town and later temporary quarters for natives, and set a corps of planners to work on a new, modern Agana. The completed plans were presented to the native "advisory" legislature.

Spokesmen for the natives feel

Spokesmen for the natives feel the plans were too elaborate, and that a recently-liberated people would better have a place to live now than a model city in the fu-

Meantime, the P. S. Commercial Co., a government arm, is trying to develop a firm economic place for the islands, and the government is passing out direct rewhen necded.

"We sent seed and food to hold them until the seed was produc-ing," the administrator said. "We're trying to get them to store stuff against hard times. They never heard of such a thing."

New Copper Sources Found in Arizona

GLOBE, Ariz.—(U.P.)—A group of Arizona mining executives estimate that the Globe-Miami district is in for a long productive life in copper mining.

Indications that there are other undiscovered and still to be developed ore bodies in the state came with the recent discovery of the San Manuel ore body south of Superior. More than 119,000 tons of copper ore have been opened by diamond drilling, although the ore body limits have not yet been determined.*

World War I brought on a search for strategic minerals, heightened by World War II. These are, through 1945: molybdenum, \$7,000,000; manganes, \$2,021,000; vanadium, \$450,000 and tungsten, \$1,000,000.
