Eisenhower Seen Retiring on Jan. 1

WASHINGTON —(U.P.)— Speculation persisted today that Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower would retire as army chief of staff on Jan. 1, 1948, to accept the presidency of Columbia university.

The general authorized a statement Thursday that he had "no intention of leaving his present assignment . . . during the current year."

The wording of the statement was interpreted in some quarters to mean that Eisenhower would step down at the end of the year. He confirmed that the board of trustees of Columbia had asked him to consider the academic post.
