

Jolson, Crosby, Durante Among Week's New Shows

Although the World Series baseball games are the most important features on the air this week to sports-minded fans, radio listeners will find numerous changes taking place on broadcasting schedules this week, including the premieres of Paul Whiteman's talent quest, Jimmy Durante's new show, Al Jolson on 'Music Hall', and the new "Spotlight Revue" with Dorothy Shay and Spike Jones' City Slickers.

This week also brings back for another season Amos 'n' Andy, Bing Crosby, Abbott and Costello, Lionel Barrymore, "Vox Pop", "Duffy's Tavern", "Aldrich Family", "Chapel Echoes", "First Nighter" and Kay Kyser, while "Lum and Abner", Lowell Thomas and Bob Hawk shift to different networks.

Today's premieres include "Hollywood Star Preview," featuring new Hollywood talent in dramas

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with famous stars on WNBC at 8:30 p.m.; "Sherlock Holmes," starring John Stanley, on WICC-MBS at 7 p.m.; "Exploring the Unknown," on WNAB-ABC at 7:30; "Your Children Today," a documentary series, on WICC-MBS at 9 p.m., and "Christopher Wells," dramatic series starring Myron McCormick as an adventuresome columnist, on WCBS at 10 p.m.

DAYTIME SHOWS
"Country Style," featuring a hill-billy disc-jockey, Hank Walden, with recorded music by western stars, becomes a half-hour daily feature over WNEW Monday through Friday at 9 a.m.

Fred Waring's Pennsylvanians move ahead an hour, to be heard Monday through Friday at 10 a.m. over WNBC. Jack Kilty's "Once Upon Our Time" moves to 11 a.m., followed by "Katie's Daughter" at 11:15.

"The Prize Show," with Joe O'Brien as emcee, offers an hour of contests and recorded music over WMCA Monday through Friday at 2:03 p.m.

"Look Your Best," featuring Richard Willis giving beauty advice to studio contestants, is scheduled on WCBS Monday through Friday at 2:30 p.m.

"House Party," with Art Linkletter as emcee, moves ahead to 3:30 on WCBS Monday through Friday.

Moray Amsterdam wins a full-hour spot on WHN Monday through Friday at 3:30 to spin records and argue with studio guests like Clark Dennis, Carmen Cavallaro and Robert Merrill who are scheduled for the opening show tomorrow.

"Winner Take All," with Bill Cullen as emcee, moves to 4:30 on WCBS, to be followed by "Give and Take" with John Reed King at 5 p.m., Monday through Friday.

"Superman" returns to WICC-MBS at 5:15, Monday through Friday.

"Lum 'n' Abner," previously an evening feature on WNAB-ABC, foreign affairs and Ned Brooks, move to WCBS Monday through Friday at 5:45.

CHANGES IN NEWCASTS
Lowell Thomas returns to CBS, the network on which he began his radio career 17 years ago, to be heard over WCBS at 6:45 p.m. Monday through Friday.

"Three Star Extra," replacing Thomas on WNBC at 6:45, will feature Ray Henle as editor-in-chief, with Felix Morley discussing foreign affairs and Ned Brooks, domestic events.

Edward R. Merrow begins a WCBS commentary series at 7:45 p.m. Monday through Friday.

"News of the World," on WNBC at 7:15, gets a second edition at 11:15 p.m., Monday through Friday.

Carey Longmire replaces Arthur Hale on WOR Tuesday and Thursday nights at 7:30.
