BYRNES IS CALLED 'WAR INSTIGATOR' IN PRAVDA BLAST

MOSCOW, Oct. 19.—(AP) Pravda declared today James F. Byrnes was a "war instigator" and said Secretary of Commerce W. Averell Harriman aspired to be the leader of "American imperialism."

The Communist party newspaper described Byrnes, former U. S. secretary of state, as "an unsuccessful diplomat who was replaced."

Pravda asserted that Byrnes' new book, "Speaking Frankly," was a "direct appeal for war with the Soviet Union" and quoted comments from several British newspapers in an effort to support this contention. It described Byrnes' plan for Germany as follows:

1. To join the French zone with the combined British and American zones
2. To conclude a separate peace with the western zones.
3. To call on the Soviet Union to withdraw its forces from eastern Germany and, if it refuses, to call on the United Nations to evict the Russians.

"This cannot be understood otherwise than as a direct appeal for war with the Soviet Union," the paper declared.

Referring to the attack on United States policies made by Soviet Deputy Foreign Minister Andrei Y. Vishinsky before the United Nations, the paper declared Vishinsky had erred in emitting Byrnes from his list of war instigators, but that Byrnes himself had made the error good.

In the first attack in the Soviet press on Harriman, wartime American ambassador to Moscow, Pravda called him a "warmonger" and said that his recent address (before the Inland Daily Press Association in Chicago last Tuesday) was "the second edition of Churchill's speech in Fulton"

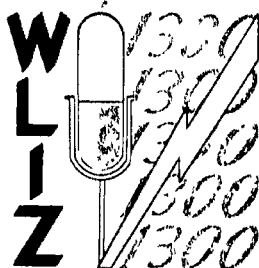
