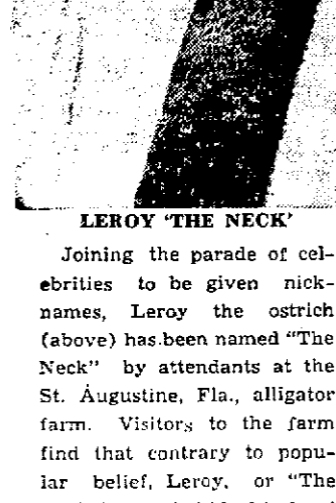
### MERCANTILE EXCHANGE

CHICAGO, Oct. 23 — (U.P.) — Shell egg futures today turned steady to higher after several sessions of heavy losses on the Mercantile Exchange. Sales totaled 579 cars.

October eggs closed unchanged at 50.25-50.50, and November was 49.95-49.50, up 25 points. December was 50-15-50.20, up 40, and January 49.45, up 35. October frozen eggs held 32.50 nominal, unchanged.

November butter finished 67.95 bid, up 45 points, and January 68.10, up 60.
