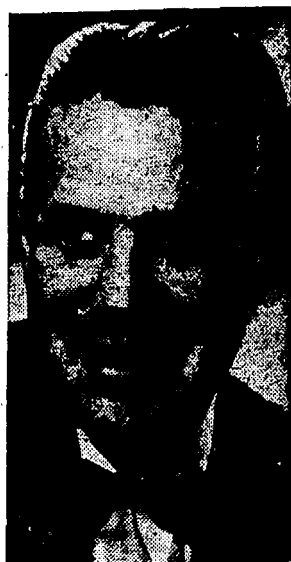

French Resort Hurt by Lack of Cold

MEGEVE, France—(U.P)—While most of France complains of insufficient heat, this winter resort is depressed over the lack of cold and snow.

Because of mild temperatures and steady rains, ski resort towns like Megeve are having a bad season. The French government had counted on millions of francs in foreign exchange from winter sports enthusiasts coming to the Alps from abroad. They have failed to materialize.

Megeve has canceled its famous skiing grand prix after days of heavy rain. Over the holidays hotels expected about 3,000 foreign guests — Americans, Canadians, Chileans and Egyptians. About 50 visitors arrived, mostly Belgians and Swiss.

The shop windows here are full of good things which recall pre-war days. There are few buyers. Russian caviar, pate de foie gras and luxurious furs remain in the shop windows day after day.

Even the usual wealthy French are absent this year. With the cost of living nearly 60 per cent higher than this time last season, they are staying away in droves.

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
