No Peace Feelers in '43 or Now, Marshall Says

WASHINGTON—(U.P.)... Secretary of State George C. Marshall said Wednesday that there was no foundation for Soviet charges that the United States sought a separpeace with Germany in 1943. He also told a news conference that there was no basis whatever for rumors that the Soviet Union put out "peace feelers" in the "cold war" at recent secret meet-

ings in Berlin.
The rumor started with reports that Ambassador Robert D. Murphy, U. S. political adviser in Berlin, has held a super-secret meeting with a high Soviet diplomat. The Soviet representative, so the rumor went, sought a way of ending the present diplomatic
