## No Peace Feelers in '43 or Now, Marshall Says

WASHINGTON—(U.P.)— Secre-  
tary of State George C. Marshall  
said Wednesday that there was no  
foundation for Soviet charges that  
the United States sought a separate  
peace with Germany in 1943.

He also told a news conference  
that there was no basis whatever  
for rumors that the Soviet Union  
put out "peace feelers" in the  
"cold war" at recent secret meet-  
ings in Berlin.

The rumor started with reports  
that Ambassador Robert D. Mur-  
phy, U. S. political adviser in  
Berlin, has held a super-secret  
meeting with a high Soviet diplo-  
mat. The Soviet representative,  
so the rumor went, sought a way  
of ending the present diplomatic  
"war."

Marshall was emphatic in deny-  
ing the report.

There is nothing to it, he said;  
there is no basis for such rumors;  
he knew nothing of such a meet-  
ing.
