New Lancaster Well Pleases City Officials

LANCASTER — City officials expressed pleasure with the performance of the new municipal well Friday after it produced 700 to 750 gallons a minute in a 54-hour continuous test. The first tests made at the conclusion of drilling last week had been disappointing. An extra 100 feet of shafting on the test pump to extending below a crevice encountered in the earth at the 380 foot level, remedied the situation, Louis Belcamper, city engineer, said.

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
