The University of Wisconsin Symphony orchestra paid tribute to music of Norway in a special concert at Music hall Thursday night.

The program, conducted by Prof. Richard C. Church, was part of Norway Week, being observed this week on the campus.

The orchestra was joined by Eva Knardahl, young Norwegian pianist, in the Grieg concerto.
