## Hoffman Sworn In as Foreign Assistance Program Director

WASHINGTON — (U.P.)— Paul G. Hoffman took over Friday in a brief White House ceremony as head of the nation's history-making foreign assistance program.

With a forceful but grave "so help me God," the automobile industrialist took the oath as administrator of economic cooperation. The oath was administered by Chief Justice Fred M. Vinson of the United States supreme court.

Pres. Truman stepped forward after the oath was administered, grasped Hoffman's hand and said:

"I have the utmost confidence in you."

Members of the cabinet then marched by Hoffman to shake his hand.

After the ceremony Hoffman joined the president and the cabinet in a meeting to hear Dr. Edwin G. Nourse, chairman of the president's council of economic advisers, outline changes in the national economy since the start of the year.

## Limit Russians in U. S., Kersten Says

WASHINGTON — (U.P.) — Rep. Charles K. Kersten (R-Wis.) has introduced a bill to limit the number of Russians in this country to the number of Americans permitted in the Soviet Union.

"Action should have been taken on this long ago," he said. "It is a foolish policy that permits an excess number of Russian nationals in the United States and permits them to wander all over our country while the American embassy in Moscow and American nationals in Russia are under guard and followed by members of the Russian police."
