## 'Photomobile' Helps 2 City Vets Take Night Club Pictures

The "Photomobile," an ex-milk wagon now carrying a camera insignia on the outside, a complete darkroom on the inside, and a familiar sight to many Madison residents, is the subject of an article in the May issue of Popular Photography magazine.

Written by Violet Witt, 3705 Winnequah, Rd., a junior in the University of Wisconsin school of journalism, the article describes how two Madison navy veterans, Monte Couch, 111 King st., and Arthur R. Le Jong, Truax Field, "merged" their interests in night club photography.

The pair's new vocation—photographing patrons of various city entertainment spots—began without the use of the portable darkroom, the article says.

Instead, one of the men took the photographs and then rushed them to a permanent dark room with a promise of a complete picture within 20 minutes.

Later, to facilitate and expand their business, the article continues, the two veterans purchased the milk truck second hand and installed a complete photographic dark room. All the equipment is powered by the use of a gas model electric generator.
