## Charles Dollard Heads Carnegie Corp.

Charles Dollard, former assistant director of the Memorial Union and summer session dean of men at the University of Wisconsin from 1936 to 1938, has been elected president of the Carnegie Corp. of New York, The State Journal learned today.

A native of Menasha, Dollard graduated from Wisconsin in 1928. He left Wisconsin in 1938 to become assistant to the president of the Carnegie Corp. He became an executive associate in 1945 and vice-president in 1947.

He spent three years in the army with the division of information and education and was discharged in 1945 with the rank of lieutenant colonel.
