Portuguese Men-of-War Invade California

SANTA MONICA, Cal.—(U.P.)—Swimmers are waging a losing fight against the amphibious attack of millions of tiny "Portuguese men-of-war," whose invasion marks the first of its kind here in 20 years.

Surf addicts and those who linger on the sunny sands report that the small, blue jellyfish packs a powerful sting that sometimes lasts 24 hours. No effective counter-measures have been found to turn the tide of battle.

The tiny floaters, dubbed "Men-of-War" because of a transparent triangular sail which rises from their 2½-inch-long bodies above the surface, are common in tropical waters at Samoa and off the southern Florida coast, but are rare in this section.
