LIMA, N. Y. (U.P.) — Mr. and Mrs. F. M. Natalie solved the housing problem by going underground. Faced with high construction costs, the Natalines decided to build just the basement of their future home. That was one year ago. Today, they are living in an attractive, well-designed basement which cost them less than \$3,500.

The home consists of a large living room with brick fireplace, bedroom, kitchen, pantry, furnace room, bath and garage. Natalie solved the labor problem by doing most of the work himself.

In five years, the Natalines expect to build the main floor. The basement will be converted into a recreation room, a bar, a laundry, and a fruit closet.
