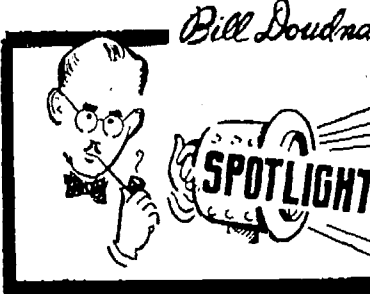

HUGOBOOM: R. Wayne Hugoboom, who was chairman of the Wisconsin Union music committee when he was a University of Wisconsin student, will study this summer in France with Robert Casadesus. Prof. Leo Steffens of the university music school also was one of the few Americans chosen to study piano with Casadesus at Fontainebleau.

Hugoboom, now professor of choral music at Indiana university, also will study composition with Nadia Boulanger during the summer. In the fall, he will go to Harvard university for advanced work with Dr. A. T. Davison. After that, he will return to France for a year's study with Mlle. Boulanger.

At Indiana, Hugoboom directs the Men's Concert choir, the Madrigal Singers, the Men's chorus, and the Girls' octet. He has also been guest conductor at choral festivals, directed the Northern Pacific Choral festival at Hays, Kan., and will lead the Indiana state choral clinic this week. He will sail for France June 29.

GERKE TWINS: Julie and Luliette Gerke will give a duo-piano recital for the 1913 university class at the Nakoma Country club tonight. They will entertain at the Pardeeville Men's club's annual "Ladies night" banquet Sunday night.
