ROCKY CLARK'S LISTENING POST

Comes the Republican convention this week, and with it the extensive radio coverage that's quite apt to crowd a lot of your favorite programs off the air. The official opening tomorrow at 11 a. m. will be carried over the networks, and thereafter you can expect any program to be interrupted or cancelled to make way for convention proceedings.

Locally WLIZ has had its transmitter, G. Gresham Griggs in Philadelphia during the past week straight up the situation and preparing to provide the station with daily "local angle" reports. Tonight he will be on at 8 o'clock with a 15-minute preview of the doings and his daily reports will be aired at 9:05 p. m. starting tomorrow.

The Connecticut State Network of which WNAB is a member will have its own convention coverage, too. Seno Gammell, news director of Hartford's WHTV will be in Philly with John Russell, deputy secretary of state, for daily broadcasts at 8:15 p. m.

The various television networks will cover the proceedings, too, and tomorrow morning's video audience will see Virginia Davis opening the convention singing the "Star Spangled Banner" in her telephonic dress—a garment designed for the occasion by Elwell. NBC's television director, it's a pale blue jersey affair with a ruff of hairpins around the neck and hem lines and a four-inch girdle of polished brass.

Elwell has also designed a second frock, featuring pictures of candidates for the presidential nomination which Miss Davis will wear when she sings a group of folk songs later in the convention. It is made of brown felt and yellow jersey panels with the names of candidates embroidered on it.

Who's going to win the nomination? Listeners to Mutual's "Opinion Air" program last Wednesday cast votes in 24 states. Dewey came in first with 42 per cent of the votes, followed by Nixon with 22 per cent. Taft and Vandenberg

11 per cent each. MacArthur, 6 per cent. Eisenhower, three.


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
