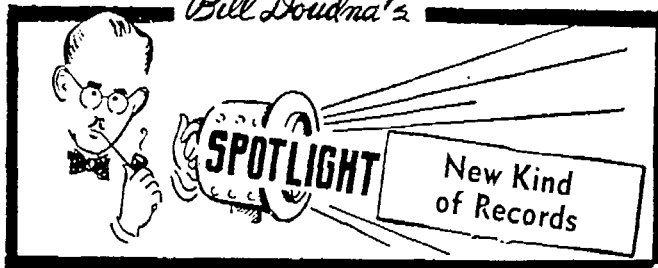

A development in home phonographs which is perhaps the most revolutionary since discs replaced cylinders was announced today in New York.

It is a non-breakable, "microgroove" record which plays 45 minutes on one 12-inch, double-faced disc. The average 12-inch record today plays 4 minutes per side.

The new record, demonstrated by Columbia Records, Inc., can reproduce an entire symphony or the whole score of a musical show on a single platter. Ten-inch discs with a 27-minute playing time also are being produced.

Columbia already has available a library of about 100 of the new recording in both the serious and popular fields.

The long-playing records require special reproducing instruments. One company has already placed on the market a record-player which can be attached to any existing radio-phonograph. It has a turntable which rotates at 33 1/3 revolutions per minute instead of the conventional 78 RPM.

The manufacturer pointed out that one of the advantages—in addition to a claim of higher fidelity—is a saving in storage space. The initial catalog of 101 records, including 325 different selections, requires only 15 1/16

inches of shelf space of home storage; in conventional albums, this music would need 94 3/4 inches.

RADIO: The air's mystery classics will be revived in Mystery Playhouse," a weekly series starting Sunday at 5 p. m. on Mutual-WGN. The programs will replace "Sherlock Holmes" for the summer.
