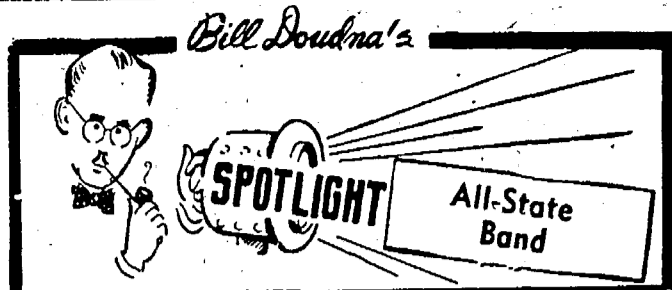

Now he's chairman of the music department at the San Francisco State Teachers college. When Chrisman finished high school, he went to the University of Michigan and, upon graduation, became assistant to William Revelli, bandmaster at Hobart. When Revelli went to Michigan, Chrisman went with him. During World War II, Chrisman served as band leader with the army air forces. Upon discharge, he went to the San Francisco post.

* Frank Sinatra (Columbia): "A Fella With an Umbrella" and "It Only Happens When I Dance With You," with Axel Stordahl's orchestra. . . Is this relaxation or fatigue?

STORY: A brash American salesman from Newark, N. J., goes to Austria to sell one of his new-fangled phonograph machines to Emperor Francis Joseph. He is escorted by his product's living trademark, a little black-and-white dog. The dog quickly arrives at an understanding with a French poodle that belongs to a haughty duchess. . . you take it from there.

HIGH POINTS: The whole air of rather aimless foolishness. . . Crosby's effortless comedy. . . handsome Technicolor. . . a charming, wholly irrelevant miniature ballet tucked unexpectedly in the middle of the picture. . . the superb, soaring beauty of Canada's Jasper national park, photographed to pinch-hit for the Tyrol (the presence in the park of an internationally famous golf course and in the case of Crosby presumably is wholly coincidental. . . but Bing won the course championship last summer a few weeks after the picture was finished).

LOW POINTS: Thin plot. . . tasteless situations. . . unusually trite musical background. . . Miss Fontaine taking the whole thing with grim seriousness.
VERDICT: Lovely to look at. . . mildly amusing.
