Fire in Oil Plant Kills 2 Workers

AMARILLO, Tex.—(U.P.)—Two petroleum workers were dead Saturday from burns received in a \$100,000 fire at the Phillips Petroleum Co. bulk plant near here.

Joe D. Foster, 27, and Dick Sikes, 22, both of Amarillo, died at a city hospital after an explosion Saturday ignited four sheet iron warehouses, four 12,000 gallon storage tanks, and three small outside tanks.

Four others were injured. Tanks caught fire immediately and thousands of gallons of gasoline went up in smoke. A witness said one of the injured was blown literally from the warehouse.

Cause of the explosion was undetermined. The tanks burned throughout the night.

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
