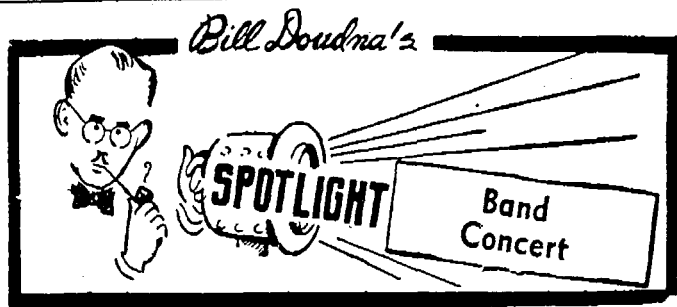

Franco Bestows Spanish Titles

MADRID — (U.P.) — Generalissimo Francisco Franco has bestowed titles of nobility for the first time since he became premier nine years ago.
 The creation of titles for at least four Spanish families was announced in the official gazette to coincide with celebrations marking the outbreak of the Spanish civil war 12 years ago. Nobility previously had been named by the king.
 Those receiving hereditary titles were:
 The wife of Jose Calvo Sotelo, murdered monarchist leader, who became Duchess of Calvo Sotelo.
 The widow of Gen. Emilio Mola, killed in an airplane crash, who became Duchess of Mola.
 The widow of Gen. Primo de Rivera, who became Duchess of Primo de Reivera. Primo de Rivera was dictator under Alphonso XIII, the last king of Spain. His son founded the Spanish Falangist (Fascist) party.
 Gen. Jose Moscardo, hero of the Alcazar fortress siege of Toledo, who became Count of the Alcazar of Toledo.
 Observers said it was significant that in a ceremony last Wednesday at El Pardo, Count Valledano, dean of the council of state, addressed Franco as "your highness."
