Director Frank Capra says his best "production" is the annual 7,000 gallons of olive oil that his Fallbrook ranch yields.

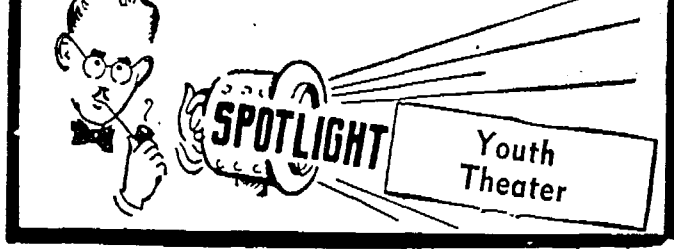

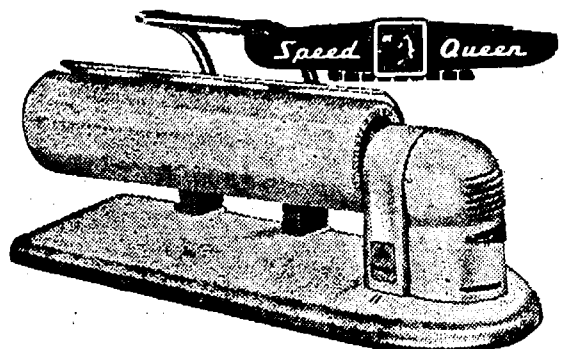
