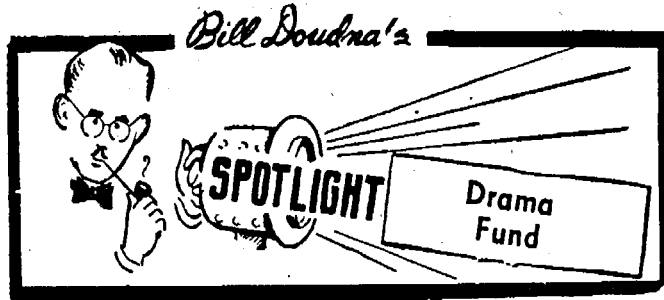

A new move in its effort to integrate the work of amateur theatrical groups in Wisconsin was announced today by the Wisconsin Idea theater (WIT). The theater is working on a plan to set up a non-profit venture called "the Drama Foundation Fund" which would help encourage "a true people's theater" in the state. The fund, which would be established at the University of Wisconsin and sponsored by the WIT, would be intended to "en-

courage creative work in theater and allied subjects all over the state," according to the Wisconsin Idea Theater Quarterly. "It has been apparent for a long while," the Quarterly said, "that some general fund was needed for the statewide encouragement of the theater and allied subjects.

"New theater organizations... very often need some sort of financial backing at the outset. Established groups, undertaking a new phase of their work, often deplore the lack of a central source where some funds may be obtained on a without-interest basis.

"Perhaps most important is the need for funds which may be easily obtainable for the purpose of experimentation with theater—to make theater a living part of the life of the people of the state. "The Drama Foundation will have such aims... as well as the additional purpose of encouragement of individuals of merit in the furthering of their efforts

within the field of drama and the theater.

"It is hoped, too, that the fund may aid in the erection of a small central theater building at the university to furnish adequate facilities for the work of the WIT."

Obviously, this fund must be set up from donations by individuals and organizations, for the WIT itself has no money-raising activities.

"We'll keep you informed of the proposal's progress—and if you're interested in helping with your money, we'll let you know where to send it when the right time comes.
