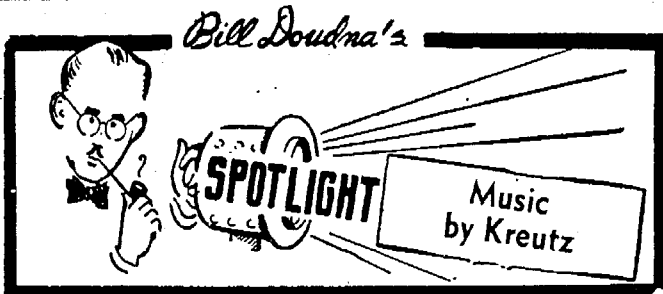


Tonight's Radio Aces

two excerpts from the music which Kreutz has been commissioned to write for a Barter Theater production of "Hamlet." They are "Dance" and "Pantomime," to be played by Nancy Fraser Smith, pianist. She will also play "Study in Jazz."

The rest of the concert will be on records and transcriptions. The music will be "Two Shakespearean Love Lyrics," sang by Helen Boatwright; "March," "Mosquito Serenade," "Variations on a Popular Tune, for Piano and Orchestra" and the second and third movements of "Music for Symphony Orchestra."

Kreutz, a former Madison man and a University of Wisconsin graduate, was soloist with the University Summer Symphony orchestra last week.

No Name

TYPE: Crime doesn't pay—forever.

STORY: A new type of gangster ("what's the sense of being in a war if you don't learn something") makes the mistake of extending his operations to the robbing of a bank, thus giving the FBI a chance to step in. Three successive murders provide clues that lead the FBI to suspect they were done by the same gang, and a special agent, with a beautiful but phony police record joins the gang to gather evidence. A crooked police commissioner who furnishes tips to the gang keeps the FBI puzzled for a time, but eventually, and inevitably they close in and the "new gang" becomes just another line-up of gunmen—some dead, some alive.

HIGH POINTS: The semi-documentary treatment, featuring the methodical, scientific research that works behind the more glamorous, out-front FBI agents... two fight scenes among the screen's best: a ring-fight, and a gun-battle... outstanding performances by Mark Stevens, as the young FBI agent, and Richard Widmark, as the benzedrine-snuffing gang-leader... convincing details on the operation of organized crime... Lloyd Nolan, who doesn't seem to get the big breaks in Hollywood, turning in his usual quiet and very satisfactory performance... a series of tense bits of action adding up to string-tight suspense.

VERDICT: For this type of film, excellent.
