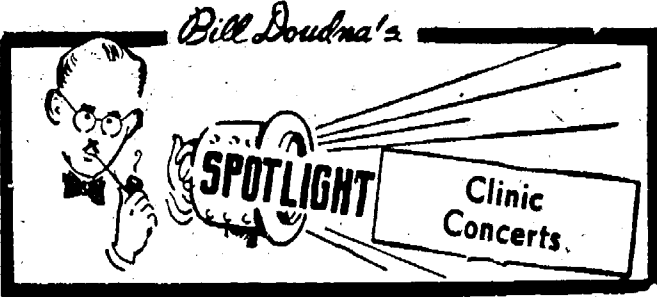

The University of Wisconsin's 1948 music clinic will end this week-end with two concerts—one by the All-State chorus, the other by the All-State orchestra. The chorus will sing at 8 tonight in

Music Hall auditorium. The orchestra will play at 8 p. m., Saturday in the stock pavilion.

Peter J. Wilhousky, New York, who is the chorus' conductor, will be assisted by several members of the clinic faculty—Helenjane Howard, Cecile Vogelbaugh, Orville Shetney and Arthur Lehman.

Kathryn Stolarevsky, the accompanist, will be replaced in some numbers by Jean Pfefferkorn, Doris Bogan, Patricia Boots and Milton Peckarsky. Achilles Balabanis, cellist, will appear in one number, "Were My Songs With Wings Provided."
