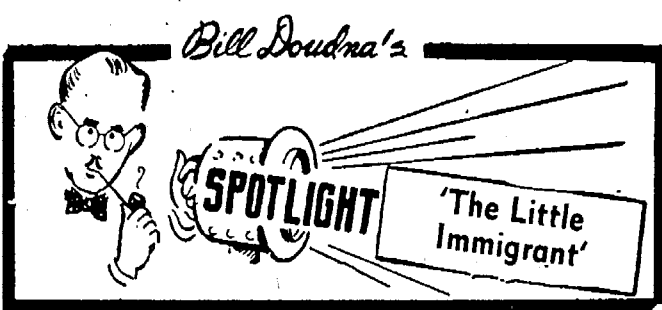

Cy Howard is back from Europe with word that "The U. S. is more popular in Italy than anywhere else on the continent." Howard spent two months overseas gathering material for a comedy-documentary, "The Little Immigrant," which will be broadcast this Fall on the Columbia network.

Howard attended the University of Wisconsin from 1936 to 1938. As Seymour Horwitz, he collaborated with J. Russell Lane on a play which Wisconsin Players presented in Bascom theater and played leading roles with the campus troupe.

After leaving Madison, he scored as script writer and actor. He wrote for Jack Benny, then turned to the stage and won critics' praise for his first Broadway appearance—the role of double-talking soldier in Maxwell Anderson's "Storm Operation."

Since then, he has made one of radio's most startling successes, writing and producing "My Friend Irma," which was an overnight hit on the airlines.

Working hard to restore their war-shattered country, the Italians look to the United States for help and inspiration, according to Howard. When he told ordinary Italians of the planned radio series, depicting the problems and adventures of an Italian immigrant in the United States, Howard said, the offers of help were overwhelming, but for the most part, he concealed his mission to insure his observation of Italian life against bias.

Reversing the position of "The Little Immigrant," who comes to America and can't quite comprehend its customs, Howard wanted to learn about Italian customs, by acting as a friendless immigrant in Italy. His intention was to get the feel of being alone in a strange country by calling on native help as little as possible. His device was the more successful because he was frequently mistaken for an Italian and those with whom he came into contact made no allowance for his language handicap. He lived in hotels never frequented by tourists, ate in out-of-the-way restaurants, kept as far as possible from the usual haunts of visiting Americans.

"Language wasn't as tough as I thought it would be," he said. "You mix 10 gestures with one word and you're in. For me, that was a cinch. I never talk 'no hands' anyway."

She and her father are at once overwhelmed with kindly attention from Tammany but it doesn't surprise them at all; they always knew America was wonderful. Even the warnings of a racket-busting New York Times reporter can't convince them.

HIGH POINTS: The quaint, charming costumes . . . Price making a silky, assured Bill Tweed . . . the nostalgic musical background.

LOW POINTS: The principal music—Sigmund Romberg's and a disappointment . . . a plot that might seem fairly bright on the stage, but proves only flimsy on the screen . . . Miss Durbin looking pudgy and clinging stubbornly to the conscious cuteness that she long since has outgrown . . . Sharpe playing the old man under the mistaken impression he is Barry Fitzgerald.

VERDICT: Tepid.
