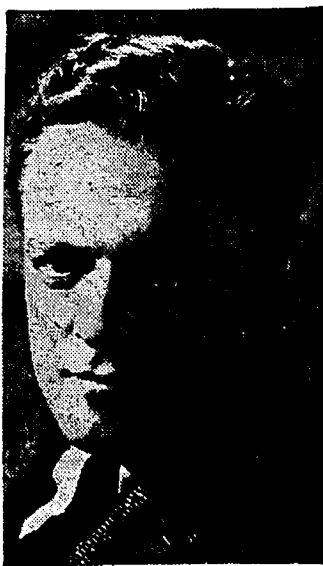

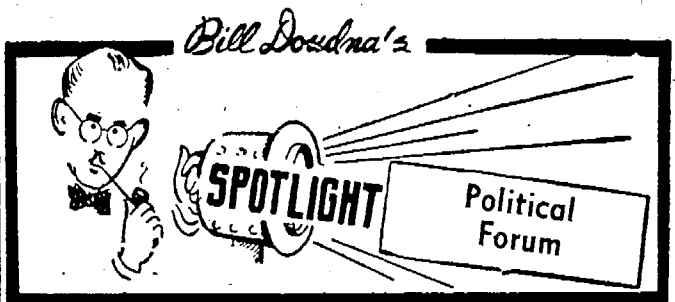
2 Cross Plains Girls to Enter Convent
