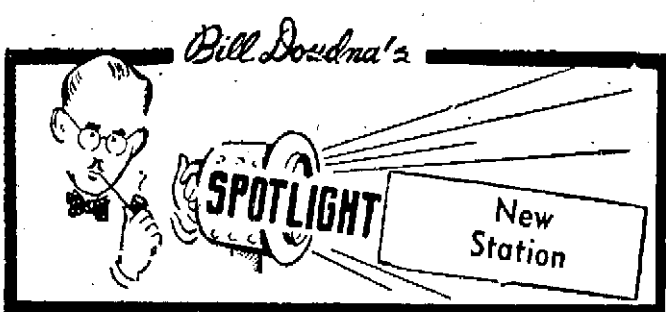

Station WFOV, Madison's only exclusively frequency modulation (FM) station, will go on the air Wednesday with a six-hour schedule. The new outlet is owned and managed by Earl Fessler.

Its studios are at 2047 Winnebago st., and its frequency is 104.9 megacycles.

On weekdays—Monday through Saturday—WFOV will be on the air from 4 to 10 p. m. On Sundays, it will broadcast from 8 a. m. to 2 p. m. Except for one half-hour period, all weekday schedules will be identical. The exception is from 8 to 8:30 p. m., when various public service features will be aired.

PLOT: Charles Boyer, refugee doctor from Austria in pre-invasion Paris without a passport, meets another refugee, Ingrid Bergman, whose desire for love and security cause her to lead a somewhat dubious life. They fall in love. A German gestapo man, Charles Laughton, whose inhuman treatment of Boyer when he was in a German concentration camp almost ruined Boyer's life, appears in Paris. Boyer plots to kill him. The film shows the plight of refugees in general who are caught in a whirlpool of international hatred.

HIGH SPOTS: Scenes in Bergman's lush apartment, provided by a rival lover. . . . In a small French cafe, Bergman and Boyer discover they are in love. . . . Boyer and Laughton meet, and Laughton thinking Boyer another loyal German, makes a date to see Paris nightlife.

LOW SPOTS: Unreality of Bergman and Boyer's initial meeting. Ditto, when Boyer comes to the aid of Bergman, shot by her other lover.

VERDICT: Very good.
