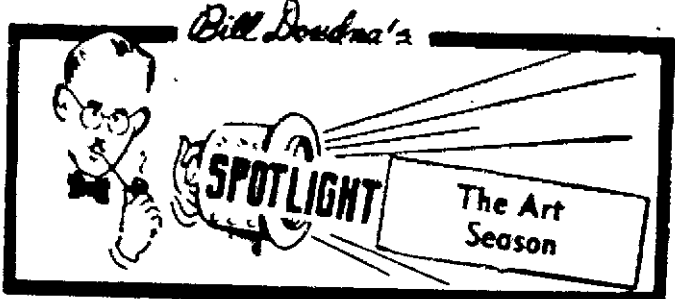

Two Centennial exhibitions of Wisconsin art will be presented in Madison by the Madison Art assn. during the 1948-49 season. Pres. Rudolph E. Langer announced today in a letter to members of the organization.

First event on the calendar will be a tea and reception for Aaron Bohrod, new artist-in-residence at the University of Wisconsin, and Mrs. Bohrod. The association will exhibit some of his works in connection with the reception.

The association plans other exhibitions during the year, and is considering a proposal for sponsoring classes in drawing and painting, limited to its members. These would be conducted at the university under the direction of members of the art faculty.

Reviewing last season, Langer pointed out that the association had "embarked upon a program of monthly art exhibitions at the city library" and had presented lectures by Prof. Philo M. Buck, Jr., of the University of Wisconsin and Prof. Wayne Claxton of Wayne university, Detroit.

The association now has 361 members, Langer said.

"Of course," he added, "there are many more people than that in Madison who are interested in art," and he asked members to try to interest others in membership. "The bigger our membership is, the more we can hope to do."
