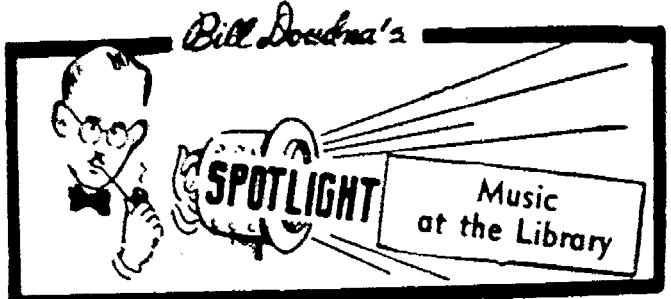
East Side Classes in Dancing to Resume

Every week is Music Week at the Madison Free library, where the city's music-lovers find records, scores, librettos, and books about music. Lillian Moehman, head of the catalog department, says that

the library has more than 1,000 bound volumes of music, in addition to the other material. These scores are for violin, organ, piano, voice, and string ensembles.

During the opera season, there is a steady demand for librettos and stories of those broadcast Saturday afternoons. And the record-lending service, which was started Feb. 1, has a steadily growing list of subscribers.

Seekers after biographical material on composers will find such standard works as "Groves Dictionary of Music and Musicians" and the "International Encyclopedia of Music and Musicians," as well as such works as "Composers in America," "Book of Modern Composers," and others.

Books of criticism and biography range from "The Bach Reader" by Igor Stravinsky's autobiography.

For beginning listeners there are such volumes as "Relax and Listen: How to Enjoy Music Through Records" and five of Dr. Sigmund Spaeth's books. The experienced concert-goer will discover such things as Abraham's "Beethoven's Second-Period Quartets" and Fuller-Maitland's "Schumann's Concerted Chamber Music."

ORCHESTRA: Every seat has been sold for the Sept. 25 concert by the New York Philharmonic-Symphony orchestra, the Wisconsin Union concert committee reported today. This means that more

than 3,000 students and townspeople will hear Leopold Stokowski and his men in the University of Wisconsin stock pavilion.

ART: The seventh Northeastern Wisconsin Art Annual will open Oct. 3 at the Neville Public museum in Green Bay. Residents of Brown, Shawano, Marinette, Outagamie, Waupaca, Door, Manitowoc, Calumet, Winnebago, and Oconto counties have been invited to submit works by 5 p. m. Sunday, Sept. 26.

Entries are limited to original temperas, oils, water colors, pastels, and graphics executed within the past two years.

Prizes will consist of \$65 in U. S. savings bonds and stamps. Four honorable mentions also will be awarded.

THE ORPHEUM: Three bands have been booked into the Orpheum theater between now and mid-October. Shep Fields will be there Sept. 28, Frankie Carle Oct. 5, and Elliot Lawrence Oct. 14.
