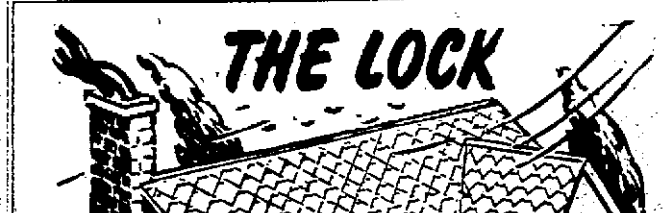
RELIGION ON THE AIR: A special congressional committee has decided that radio stations need not grant atheists free time to reply to religious programs.

The committee accordingly advised the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) to make that clear in its regulations, or the next session of congress will be asked to do so by legislative action.

Commission Chairman Wayne Coy promptly issued a statement declaring that the agency's decision precipitating the controversy, had been widely misinterpreted. He said the FCC's so-called "Scott decision" of 1946 does not require stations to give rebuttal time to atheists.

The special house committee headed by Rep. Forrest A. Harness (R-Ind.) said "the broadcast of a regular religious worship from a church, cathedral, temple, or synagogue does not represent a public controversy which in the public interest requires that time be granted to those who would destroy the church in America."
