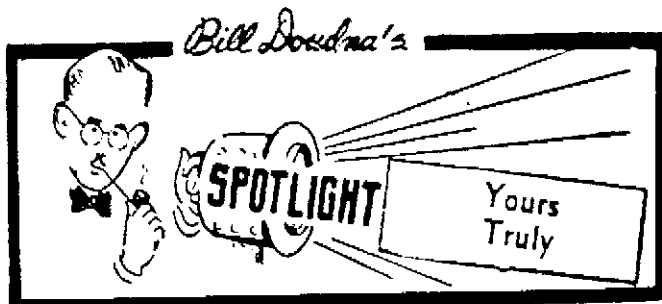

# Danny Kaye Tells a Tale About Danny

(Edith Gwynn is on vacation.)

HOLLYWOOD — So Edith Gwynn calls and says, "Danny, be funny on paper. Do Edie a favor and write 800 breezy words loaded with laughs."

Now I know what Robert Louis Stevenson meant when he said, "I hate to write but I love to have written." This is murder! And the next time I get overworked and need a vacation, which will probably be in the middle of this picture, I'm going to call Miss G. and say, "Edie, we need a twelve minute song-and-dance spot in 'Happy Times' and I want to get in a week of golf."

"Hop into my makeup and make the yaks in front of the technicolor camera, will you please, just for Danny-boy?" Since writing is not my business any more than performing is Edie's and since being funny on the screen is a lot different from being hilarious on paper and since Edith Gwynn is an expert not to be outdone reporting the Hollywood scene I would be much happier simply putting down a true story that happened to me.

It's about the most exciting engagement of my life, my six weeks at the Palladium theater in London.

That extended personal appearance taught me the lesson of the century that a people cannot be judged by the fictional characters that represent them in stage, screen or storybook portrayals.

The average American is prone to think of the English as cool, reserved and unemotional. From where I stood this was a total misconception.

And I stood up on a huge stage getting my facts from audience reaction. A Palladium audience represents every cycle and every level of English life. Within the four walls of the theater I found

all Englishmen to be emotional, appreciative and completely show-wise.

This is not a lone-wolf attitude on my part. Tony Martin, the Andrews Sisters, Jack Benny and Dinah Shore will tell you the same thing. The English took all of us into their hearts.

When a Britisher goes to the theater he wants to have fun. He is prepared to laugh before he shows his ticket at the door. If you measure up to his expectancy then "the roof falls in."

There's an ancient custom at the Palladium which helps every performer.

Every backstage employe was once a performer himself. The result is unparalleled cooperation and understanding from the crew who handle curtain, scenery, props and lighting. And, believe me, you can lay an egg without the help of the boys backstage.

And they have something else at the Palladium that American theater owners should get wise to. No popcorn and coke concessions as in our picture palaces, but tea, cake, sandwiches and short orders at a restaurant located right in the theater.

This satisfies a primary need of many theater goers who like to stop off for a quick snack just before or just after the show. I know American theater-fans who dream about it. The English do it.

I sneaked a look at the audience from behind the curtain the night Mr. and Mrs. Winston Churchill came to the Palladium. Man alive! The reception was unbelievable.

There were the people, most of whom had voted him out of power, standing on their seats screaming and cheering when "good old Winnie" entered the theater. Some think happened the evening the king and queen, accompanied by the Princesses Elizabeth and Margaret and the royal consort, the Duke of Edinburgh, did me the honor of attending a performance.
