Bing Crosby, Eddie Cantor, Gracie Allen, Al Jolson, "The Aldrich Family," "A Date with Judy" and the Perry Como "Supper Club" series are among the features returning from vacation this week as radio's fall-winter schedule gains momentum. Several new shows are starting, too, including "Great Scenes from Great Plays" starring Walter Hampden on WICC-CBS Friday at 8 p.m. Here are the important happenings this week:

Herb Shelner, harmonica-playing comic, and Raymond Scott's Quintet take over the 8:30 spot on WCCB, Monday through Friday, replacing "Lum 'n' Abner" who are launching a weekly half-hour show Sunday nights.

Perry Como returns as WNBC's "Supper Club" singing host Monday, Wednesday and Friday at 7 p.m. With him are the Fontaine Sisters and Mitchell Ayres' orchestra. Jo Stafford will run the Tuesday "Supper Club" session, with the Starlighters and Paul Weston's orchestra. Peggy Lee will handle the Thursday show, with Dave Barbour's orchestra and the King Cole Trio.

"How to Speak English," a new

series during which a girl with a typical Brooklyn accent is to be given a complete speech transformation by a college professor, starts over WNEW Monday at 10 p.m.

Using rare recordings, dating back to 1890, by such all-time greats as Enrico Caruso, Nellie Melba, Gull-Curel and Will Rogers, Wally Butterworth will present "Great Voices" over WNBC Monday, Wednesday and Friday at 11:15 p.m.

"A Date with Judy" returns to NBC Tuesday night at 8:30, with Louise Erickson back in the title role, John Brown and Myra Marsh play the father and mother, with Dix Davis as brother Randolph, Dick Crenna as boyfriend Oogie and Sandra Gould as Mitzi.

"A Treasury of American Folklore" begins over WNEW Tuesday at 9 p.m., with the story of Casey Jones, the engineer, Ralph Waldo Cummings sings the famous folksong while Raymond Edward Johnson portrays Casey in the dramatization. A "Treasury of Jewish Folklore" starts Thursday at 9 p.m. on the same station.

"Presenting Peole," a new musical variety show starring Bob Peole as emcee, will be heard on WOR Tuesday and Wednesday nights at 9:30. Arlie Malvin and a guest girl singer will appear with Emerson Buckley's band.

The Original Amateur Hour, founded by Major Bowes and carried on by his staff with Ted Mack as emcee, begins over WNBC-ABC Wednesday at 8 p.m. This becomes ABC's big night again this season, with Milton Berle's "Star Theater" following at 9, Groucho Marx' quiz at 9:30 and Bing Crosby at 10.

"The Aldrich Family," back in its old Thursday night spot on NBC at 8 p.m., begins its tenth year on the air with Ezra Stone back as "Honny," Jackie Kell as Homer, House Jameson and Kay Raft as "Mr. and Mrs. Aldrich."

George Burns and Gracie Allen, back on NBC Thursday night at 8:30 welcome a new handliner, Larry Labin. And Al Jolson reopens his NBC "Music Hall" a half-hour later, with Oscar Levant and Lou Brigg's orchestra.

Eddie Cantor returns at a new day and hour—Friday at 9 p.m.—over NBC. Billie Burke and Harry Von Zell join Eddie in comedy routines, while Dinah Shore will be singing star.

"My Favorite Husband," starring Lucille Ball, moves into Columbia's 7 o'clock spot Saturday night, to be followed at 7:30 by the Vaughn Monroe show. Vic Damone's "Saturday Night Serenade" shifts to NBC Saturday at 7:30 p.m.

"Hollywood Star Theater" moves to NBC's 8 o'clock spot Saturday night with Margaret O'Brien introducing her aunt, Marianna O'Brien, as the talented new star of the week.

Judy Canova returns to NBC Saturday night at 9:30, with Mel Blanc as Pedro and Ruby Dandridge as Geranium.
