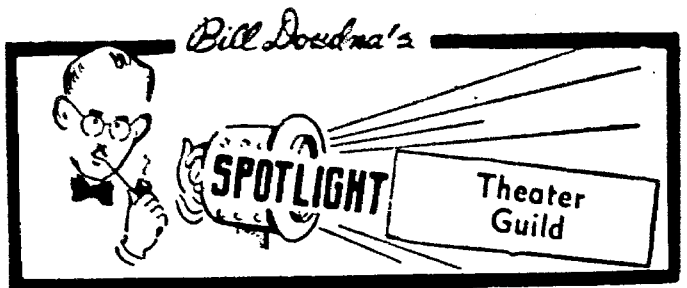

**RADIO:** The Episcopal church invades the field of radio drama today in what is believed to be the first time a church has sponsored a commercial-type program.

The program, called "Great Scenes from Great Plays," will be aired over Mutual at 7 p. m. The first half-hour show will be "Cyrano de Bergerac," starring Walter Hampden.

The Rt. Rev. **HAMPDEN** Henry Knox Sherrill, presiding bishop of the Episcopal church, explained that the religious part of the program would be confined to a short narration showing the importance of religious teaching in modern life. He said it was an attempt to reach the 70,000,000 Americans who are without church affiliation.

• **Favorite band vocalists:** Vaughn Monroe and June Christy.

• **Favorite small groups:** Pied Pipers, vocal, and King Cole trio, instrumental.

• **Most promising band:** Elliott Lawrence; vocalists, Vic Damone and Pat-U Page.

• **Favorite albums:** Popular, "Progressive Jazz," Stan Kenton; classical, "Gayne" ballet suite, New York Philharmonic-Symphony; children's, "Buns Bunnies" (Capitol).

• **Favorite classical singer:** Nelson Eddy. **Favorite symphony orchestra:** Boston Pops.

• **"The Disc Jockeys' Disc Jockey":** Dave Garroway.
