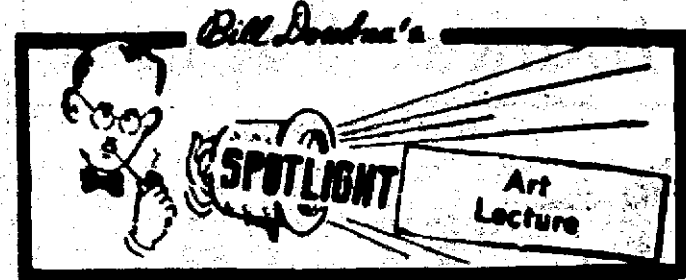

Prof. John Kienitz will lecture on "Picasso, Dali, Miro" at 6:30 p. m. Wednesday in 112 Bascom hall. The lecture, open to the public, will be sponsored by the university departments of art history (of which Kienitz is a member), Spanish, and Portuguese.

MILWAUKEE: For its major fall show, the Milwaukee Art institute is presenting "Masters of Impressionism" through Nov. 15. The 53 paintings include works of Monet, Manet, Renoir, Gauguin, Degas, Van Gogh, Toulouse-Lautrec, Childe Hassam, and others.

The exhibit and the one-man display by Joseph Bradley of Madison are open Monday through Saturday from 9 a. m. to 5 p. m. and Sunday from 2 to 5 p. m.

RADIO: Television-tuners in the New York, Philadelphia, and Baltimore areas can be certain of seeing the nation's five most important track meets of the season. The sponsor of such shows as Bob Hawk's quiz on CBS and "Grand Ole Opry" on NBC will bankroll the video views of the Millrose games, the N. Y. Athletic club, the National AAU, the IC&A, and the Knights of Columbus competition, all from Madison Square Garden, with CBS-TV as the outlet. Many Olympic champs will be seen for the first time in competition since winning their international titles.

The so-called thrill serials leave youngsters between the ages of 10 and 16 somewhat bored, according to a nationwide survey just completed by the Boys' Athletic league of New York. Topping all network shows as their favorite program is "Blondie," now on NBC Wednesday nights.

Alan Young, comedian on the new Jimmy Durante show over NBC Friday nights, is one of the first Hollywood names to offer his services as an entertainer-visitor to war victims in Veterans

Administration hospitals. These tours by Hollywood personalities will launch a permanent program in which all branches of show business in the movie colony have united to pledge two periods a year of two months each of stars' visits to the 107 hospitals served by the V. A. Young will go to Texas hospitals while the Durante show airs from that state for three weeks.

The "Dr. I. Q. Jr." series starring Lew Valentine returns to the air Jan. 9 on NBC after an absence of several months.
