



Helen E. Frey, Milwaukee, is the 1948-49 winner of the H. V. Kaltenborn radio scholarship at the University of Wisconsin. The scholarship is granted to "an outstanding student worthy of assistance in preparing for a career in the field of radio broadcasting," the university radio committee explained. Qualifications include scholarship, special aptitudes and interest in broadcasting, and evidence of planning for a career which includes radio.

Miss Frey is acting script editor for the Wisconsin School of the Air and, at the same time, is carrying a full schedule of classes as a senior majoring in English. She prepared the teachers' manual for the current "Book Trails" series.

The scholarship winner will make script writing, especially for children, her career. One of her earliest stories, "Wilbur, the Sleepy Little Ghost," won a national award in 1941 and has been repeated in WHA and Mutual network broadcasts since that. It will be heard again Tuesday in the "Let's Draw series on WHA.

The scholarship was created by Kaltenborn, Wisconsin-born NBC commentator, three years ago. The income of a \$15,000 trust fund income is available for the scholarship.

First winner was Giraud Chester, now assistant professor of radio education at Cornell university. Second was Clifford Owen, now with the armed forces radio network in Berlin.
