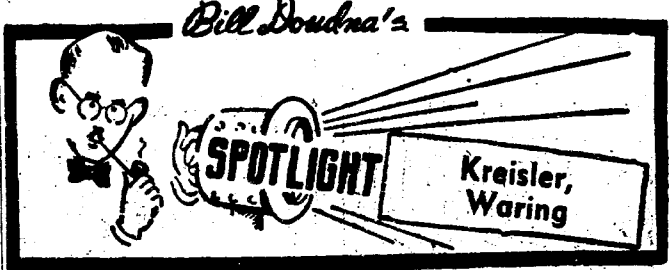

Another full house will greet Fred Waring and his Pennsylvanians at 8 p. m. Friday in the University of Wisconsin field house. The concert will be sponsored by the Homecoming committee: All the 9,200 tickets have been sold. "Our only regret," says Ray L. Hilsenhoff, student financial adviser, "is that we do not have more seats available."

Among Waring's artists will be Leonard Kranendonk, baritone, who was regular performer at WHBL, Sheboygan, before he went to New York to study and, eventually, to join Waring. The tentative program includes his singing of "My Journey's End."

Waring favorites on the tentative schedule include "The Nutcracker Suite," in Harry Simeone's glee-club-orchestra arrangement; "Fiddle Faddle," "Dry Bones," "My Hero," Uncle Lumpy Brannum's Hawaiian travelog, "The Lord's Prayer" (sung by Stuart Churchill), and the Gearhart-Morley two-piano playing of "The Blue Danube."
