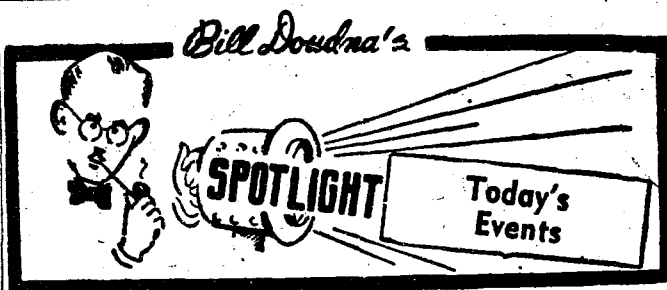


Tonight's Radio Highlights
