REHEARSAL: The first broadcast rehearsal of the Boston Symphony orchestra will be aired by WIBA at 10:30 tonight. The pro-gram was carried on the NBC network Monday noon and transcribed for Madison area listeners.

This is the first time that a major symphony organization and a radio network have joined in broadcasting rehearsals. Dr. Serge Koussevitzky's rehearsals have always been held behind closed doors, but in this, his 25th anni-versary and final year as conductor of the Boston Symphony orchestra, he has agreed to open the rehearsals to a nationwide radio audience.

The program marks a new association of the National Broadcasting Co. and the Boston Symphony, which also will extend to broadcasts from the Berkshire festival at Tanglewood, Mass., next summer. Broadcasts of the

Boston Pops orchestra also will be presented.

The rehearsal broadcasts will be entirely unprepared. Kousse-vitzky will rehearse exactly as he always does, stopping the orchestra, repeating, correcting and ex-plaining. The broadcasts are de-signed to give music lovers and students an opportunity to listen to a great symphony orchestra and conductor at work. The programs will originate

each week from the stage of Boston's Symphony hall. The season's guest conductors also will be heard in the series.
