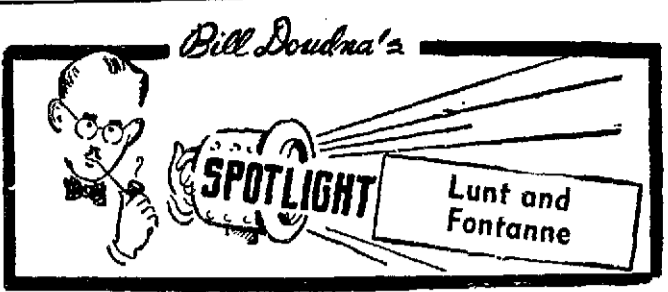

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All seats have been sold for six of the seven performances of the new Alfred Lunt-Lynn Fontanne play which will open Feb. 22 at the Wisconsin Union theater.

Mail orders took all tickets for the five night shows and the Saturday matinee. A few tickets remain for the Thursday matinee, the theater boxoffice said.

Students, townfolk, alumni, and out-of-town theatergoers swamped the boxoffice with orders for the world premiere of S. N. Behrman's comedy, as yet untitled.

"Opening night is expected to be among the notable 'first nights' in the history of the theater," an official said today, "with a formally-dressed crowd jamming the playhouse, as happened 10 years ago when the theater opened with the Lunts playing 'The Taming of the Shrew.'"

- Apr. 23-May 7, Wisconsin Rapids, for Taylor, Clark, Marathon, Portage, Wood, Juneau, Adams, Waushara, Marquette, and Green Lake counties.

Danny Kaye, who entertained for hours at the Jack Benny party, will be named honorary mayor of Brooklyn when he goes to N. Y. for his stage stint.

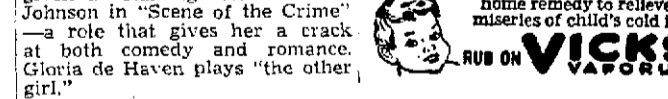
Tallulah Bankhead is writing a story about Ethel Barrymore for Colliers'.
