# Pres. Fred Aids Big Library Plan

## Carnegie Corp. Grants Half Million to Center

A half-million dollar grant for the establishment of a Midwest Inter-Library Center in Chicago, proposed by five university officials including Pres. Fred of the University of Wisconsin, has been approved by the Carnegie Corporation of New York, Ernest Cadman Colwell, president of the University of Chicago, announced Saturday.

Plans are under way for incorporation of a non-profit corporation to operate the proposed center, a "libraries' library" to improve library resources of the Midwest, Colwell, who is chairman of the organizing committee, said.

### Fred on Committee

The organizing committee includes Pres. Fred and officials from Indiana university, the University of Iowa, and the University of Minnesota.

The center is to furnish central housing and servicing for a cooperative deposit and use of research materials by participating libraries.

The boards of 10 Midwestern universities, Chicago, Illinois and the Illinois Institute of Technology, Indiana, Iowa, Michigan State, Minnesota, Northwestern, Purdue, and Wisconsin, have approved the proposal in principle and have authorized their institutions to participate in the future planning and organizing of the corporation.

### Promise of More

An additional \$250,000 will be granted by the Carnegie Corp. If an equal sum in cash is made available from other sources by June 30.

The proposed million-dollar library is expected to be built as soon as plans can be completed and a site selected in Chicago.

Plans for the center call for "cooperative housing of little used material, coordination of collecting policies for materials, and the exploration of cooperative technical and bibliographic services."

### Others To Be Invited

The initial staff will probably include a director, two professional people, and clerical group of about six.

Operating expenses for the initial period is expected to run at \$50,000 a year, the cost of services to be divided among the member institutions on a formula basis.

Invitations to other groups to participate will be extended as the project is developed, Colwell said.
