Alice Faye, Phil Harris Keep Show on NBC

HOLLYWOOD — (U.P.) — Alice Faye and Phil Harris have signed a contract keeping their radio show on the National Broadcasting Co. network through 1949 and 1950. NBC has announced.

President Justin Dart of the Rexall Drug Co., sponsor of the comedy show, spiked rumors that the team would follow other top NBC stars to the Columbia Broadcasting system.

NBC officials said Harris probably will continue to make appearances on the Jack Benny show, which recently moved to CBS.
