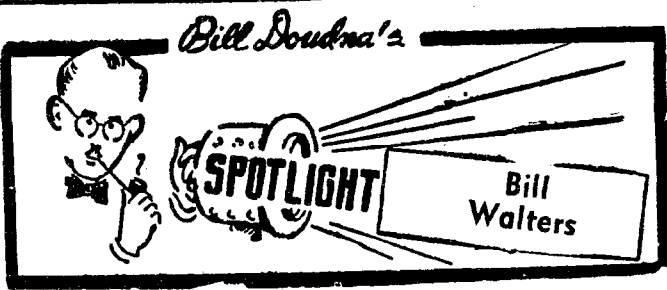

When William Walters was in Washington school, it wasn't the modern building in which present Washington pupils attend classes. Then it was the old school on W. Johnson st. which now houses Dane county offices.

This afternoon, Bill will be on the stage of the new Washington school, acting and dancing for the handicapped children of Madison who will be there to see the Edwin Strawbridge production of "Little Red Riding Hood." The boys and girls will be the guests of "Roundy's Fun Fund," which has brought the New York company to Madison expressly for them.

Bill was born in Madison and attended Wisconsin high school after completing his work at Washington.

Then he moved west, and served in the merchant marine during World War II—he was too young to join the army, navy, or marine corps. His mother, Mrs. Clyde Soderberg, lives in San Diego.

After the war, Bill studied dancing with Mia Slavenska, who now is touring with her own ballet company after being starred with other ballets. On her advice, he continued his studies in New York.

Bill's story typifies the story of the world's youths who want above all else to have a career in the theater, in dancing, or in music.

It's a story of hard work, hour after hour and day after day.

In New York, Bill spent nine hours a day working in a drug store to help pay for his dancing lessons—and he spent several more hours a day with his teacher; and any dancer will tell you that ballet lessons aren't pure recreation—they're hard work, no matter how much enjoyment the dancer gets out of them.

The present tour of the Strawbridge company isn't all joy, either, even though it brings the satisfaction of making kids happy, of gaining more and more experience, and, in Bill's case, of visiting the old home town.

The company travels by car and truck. Since Oct. 1, the troupe has covered 22,000 miles and has visited every state in the union except Maine.

Walters got an extra workout a few weeks ago when the troupe had to make a 1,000-mile jump virtually overnight.

One of the players became ill, and had to be left in Birmingham, Ala.

So Bill took the wheel of the



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truck which his companion usually drove, and piloted it that 1,000 miles—in time to give a performance only two hours after arrival.

Meanwhile, the lines had to be rearranged to make up for the missing actor, and the cast had to learn them in time for the show.

"We made it," Bill said, "and the audience never knew the difference."
