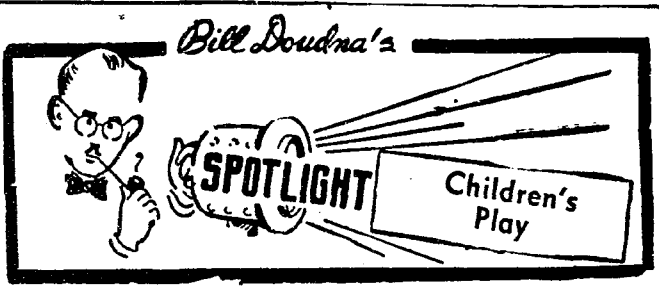

A lively combination of dancing and drama brought the story of "Red Riding Hood" to the stage of the Washington school auditorium Thursday afternoon for a whooping, cheering audience of youngsters and a few adults. It was a refreshing production, acted with the same happy attention as that with which the children out front received it.

Many of those children will never dance, many could not hear the music nor the lines. For this audience was composed almost exclusively of boys and girls who are physically handicapped. But they loved every bit of it.

And there was one white-haired man in the audience who got a particular thrill out of it. He was Will Wells, retired head of the Wells Printing Co., who had come to Madison to see his grandson, William Walters, appear in the play.

The children learned, too, that Walters had once thought he could never walk again. When he was a small boy both his legs were broken in an automobile accident—but he recovered so well that Thursday he was doing Russian cossack steps and Czech polkas.

The Edwin Strawbridge company used a new script by Virginia Dorris Dugan which eliminated the fears and gore of the old story without losing its touches of suspense and excitement. Colorful Czech costumes, good settings, and Samuel Ewell's effective piano accompaniment added to the enjoyment.

Strawbridge played the Wolf, a timid soul who was tricked into thinking himself fierce. He had the youngsters with him every moment he was in sight—talking to them, capering for them, and throwing himself into the spirit of the affair with abandon.

Lisa Parnova was an attractive, girlish Marie ("Red Riding Hood"), and teamed with Walters in some excellent dancing as well as dancing well alone.

The play was brought here by "Roundy's Fun Fund," raised by The State Journal sports columnist. All handicapped children in the public schools and members of the Community Center's Happy Hour club for handicapped young adults were the fund's guests.

One can hope that next season Strawbridge and his troupe can be brought back for all children to see.

ART SHOW: The Wisconsin State Journal will award a \$25 prize in the University of Wisconsin Student Art show next week. Judging of entries will begin Saturday and the show will open Thursday.

The State Journal prize will be in Class A, which includes oil, tempera, gouache, pastel, water color, and mixed media. A total of \$230 will be given in this division.

In Class B (graphics), \$80 will be awarded. Class C (sculpture) will award winners will share \$90. Class D (pottery, ceramics, commercial

design, art metal, and photography) will have \$45 in cash and a merchandise award.

WOMEN'S CHORUS: The University of Wisconsin Women's chorus and Lucille Campbell Cooper and Robert Monschein, duo-pianists, will give a concert at 8 tonight in Music hall. Helene S-Thomas Blotz will conduct the chorus.

The chorus also will sing works of Spross, Bach, Brahms, Morley, Foster, and others.

The pianists will play "Es Ist ein' Ros' Entsprungen," Brahms; "Ma Mere l'Oye," Ravel; "Marzurka Elegiaca," Britten, and "Fantasia for Musical Clock Work," Mozart-Busoni.

What the Legislature Did Thursday

SENATE

Passed and sent to the assembly a bill to "unfreeze" \$1,600,000 of post-war construction funds for improvements at three state mental institutions.

Killed a bill that would raise the ceiling on claims for "wrongful death" from \$12,500 to \$25,000.

ASSEMBLY

Killed, 68 to 22, a bill to repeal the 15-cent state tax, and dealers' licenses, on olemargarine.

Gave preliminary approval to a bill to permit state residents over 65 to fish without a license.
