Magazine-Seller Pleads Not Guilty to Assault Charge

Roy Edward Hancock, Hannibal, Mo., a member of a magazine selling crew, pleaded not guilty in superior court late Friday afternoon to charges of assault with intent to do great bodily harm to Joe J. Zeimet, 21, of 2525 Monona dr.
 Zeimet was in Methodist hospital for treatment of a brain concussion caused by a blow from a tire wrench, allegedly swung by Hancock during an argument in the 100 block on E. Wilson st. Thursday night.
 Police reported that doctors said Zeimet was alive "only because he had an unusually thick skull."
 Hancock was released on \$500 bail pending preliminary hearing in superior court next Thursday. Also placed on \$200 bail was Gaston Mercier, Miami, Fla., another of the magazine selling crew, who, police said, was needed as a material witness for Hancock's hearing.
 Zeimet claimed the magazine men stopped his car on E. Wilson st. and hit him with the wrench.
 Hancock said Zeimet struck the rear of his station wagon, and forced his wife's car off the street to "get even" because an argument between Hancock and one of Zeimet's friends earlier at the Big Wheel tavern, 2109 Monona dr., resulted in the friend's being arrested by Blooming Grove police.
 The magazine men are represented by Atty. Darrell MacIntyre and Deputy Dist. Atty. William L. McCusker is handling the state's case.

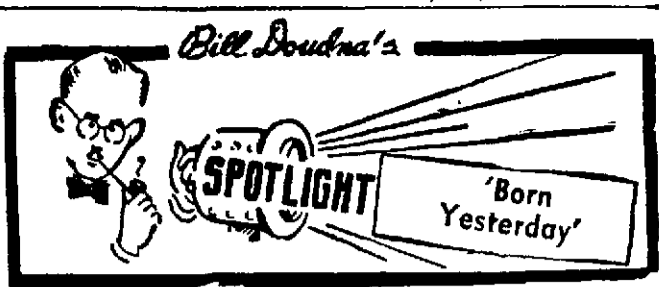

Harry Brock, who started in business by stealing a paper route and became the world's No. 1 junk man—and proud of it—made one serious mistake. He hired a man to teach his girl friend how to behave in Washington society; his mistake was hiring a man who could teach the girl to think.
 Hard, blustering, bulldozing, and utterly selfish, Harry Brock was pictured in all his brutality by Lon Chaney in a first-rate production of "Born Yesterday" at the Parkway theater Friday night. It will be repeated at 3 p. m. today and at 8:30 tonight.

Paired with him was Jean Parker as the chorus girl who lived with him nine years before she learned that there was a life outside the kind she was leading. Miss Parker's characterization of the dumb, equally selfish, thoughtless, and carefree woman was even better than Chaney's portrait of her lover. And her transformation at the hands of an idealistic magazine man appeared, in her acting and in Garson Kanin's writing, to be a perfectly normal thing.
 Scott McKay was the writer. He played the role with quiet ease and a sturdy equilibrium in the face of Brock's tantrums and Billie's ignorance. Handsome, virile, and intelligent, McKay appears to be an actor who will go far.
 Hans Robert and Vicki Weldon were good as a weaking senator, bribed by Brock, and his wife; Carroll Ashburn seemed uneasy as the big man's legal brain, and William Foran did well with the virtually silent, ubiquitous, and slightly cunning cousin who was Brock's lackey.

Even with the bawdy basic situation, even in the interest of "naturalism" the unbridled profanity of the script was uncalculated. Often it seemed inserted solely for the sake of shock, which the play didn't need.
 The funniest scenes in the whole show didn't use it, nor did the tensest ones. Those hilarious highlights were a gin-rummy game between Harry and Billie; the later's attempt to play the lady with the senator's wife, and Harry's first try at book-reading. The whole thing moved fast, seeming shorter than its 2 1/2 hours. Donald Oenslager's lavish setting of a super-swank suite was perfect.
