year. The Point will be a base for the navy's Arctic oil fields and weather stations. During 11 months of the year, it is frozen. The navy's expedition this year


will consist of from three to five Navy cargo vessels, two LST's and an ice-breaker. The party will San Diego June 20 and return Aug. 25.
